Rose Notes from Maryellen Sherman, MG

Hello fellow gardeners.

Today is a beautiful day and it makes one anxious to get outside, but remember it's still winter. Don't think about pulling that mulch away from your rose plants until the end of March. Keep soil moist, but not soggy—watering once a month should be enough. Spray roses with dormant oil this month.

In your soil classes did you talk about having your soil tested? This is a good time to get that done so you can start to 'feed' the soil with the correct products as spring gets closer.

If you ordered bare-root roses they should be

arriving any day. Before you unpack them, fill buckets with water and add a root stimulator, mix it well and then add the roses. The water should be deep enough to completely cover the bare-roots. Soak the roots 1 to 3 days before you plant them in the ground or in pots. Mound the canes with coarse dry mulch to keep the roots from dehydrating or sunburn. Leave the mulch on and keep it moist. You can start to pull the mulch away when the leaves begin to appear in April, and then slowly remove the mulch after the last frost date in your area.

The American Rose

Society has chosen 'Francis Meiland' as the 2013 rose of the year. It is shell pink in color turning to white as it ages, very fragrant and 6-7 ft high and 3 ft wide.

You will soon see a new tag on roses that the ARS recommends—it will be AGRS (The American Garden Rose Selection). In the future, we can expect these roses to be the caliber of 'Knock-Out' in terms of disease resistance and productivity.

Your Sandoval County Master Gardener Status

This is my third year as an active member of the SCMG program. When I first began my Internship and after my graduation in 2011, I had many questions about what to file where and when, who to pay, and when and what to do to keep my active status. I am hoping this article will answer all those questions for you, even though all this information can be found in our recently revised Policies.

So, you sign up to become an Intern in the SCMG program, send in your fee and get accepted into the program. The fee you pay covers all the class instruction during the winter-spring sessions, admittance to any and all off-site or advanced classes and workshops, and all class materials. You are also welcome to attend any and all board meetings. You won't have a vote on any of the agenda items, but your voice and opinions are important.

Now comes the fun part -- volunteerism. This is what it's all about, sharing and gathering information with the public about gardening issues. When you complete the class portion of the program, you aren't expected to know everything about gardening in Sandoval County, but you

should have a pretty good base of knowledge as to where to find the answers. I'm still on that very long learning curve myself and I find every time I'm out working with other Interns and Veterans I'm always learning something.

As an Intern, you have earned your ten hours of education requirement once you have completed the training class. You just need to accumulate 30 more hours of volunteer time, before your graduation in the fall. The volunteer forms are sent in by August 31st and you are asked to also include any hours you expect to complete in September on that form. Volunteer Forms are collected early, so we have a tally of who has earned their status as a graduate of the program.

Each year there is an education requirement, a hotline related requirement, plus other volunteer hours and dues (currently \$15.00) to be paid at each graduation date to maintain your active status. For those of you who cannot attend graduation, there is a grace period, up to mid-December, to get your dues paid. With all the various activities offered, it isn't a hardship to collect those 40 hours each year. If you, as an Intern, have some question about some of the

opportunities available, then speak to your Mentor. Upon graduation, you are eligible to vote at annual meetings for board elections and membership business.

Now, we'll have a brief discussion about Leave of Absence status. The hope is that you stay active for many years, but there may be a reason you would want to apply for an LOA. The LOA status requires that you pay your dues each year, and notify the County Agent and the Coordinator in writing with a statement about the reason and the projected length of time you will be inactive. There is the short term LOA lasting one to two years and then a longer LOA lasting up to 5 years. With this LOA status you still have voting rights. Should you decide to get back to active status, all you need to do is to start collecting those volunteer hours and then submit them along with your dues by mid-September. Should you decide that SCMG just isn't a good fit for you, please submit in writing why you would like to resign from the program. Please refer to the SCMG policy regarding LOA's.
