Outreach report + Member Engagement Proposal copied below

Outreach Report:

There are the items from the Outreach Committee that need to be discussed(and decided?) by the Advisory Committee. 1) Project from Steve Lucero and Madeline Gruney. The Outreach Committee sends the Project request to the Advisory Council for approval. The Project does not have a Project chair(s) and that will need to be done. Ms Gruney has a plan to fund the project by selling Honorariums for names to be placed on benches, a wall honoring county fair organizers, past 4-H leaders, and others who have contributed to the 50 year history of the Sandoval County Fair in Cuba. At the present time there is a plan for a small area between the bathrooms and the designated vendor area that is uneven, filled with plant material of unknown type, and trash. If this could be used as a sitting area for fair attendees, a safe transit area for those going from the vendor area to the stage and food area, it would be a great improvement to the fairgrounds. SEMG would be responsible for the restoration/landscaping of the area. At this time we are the idea people, the funding is to come from the Honorariums that will be handled by Grunev/Lucero at the extension office. Public Works has agreed to supply the water for the project. If the Advisory Council approves we will start looking for project chairs. 2) The Outreach Committee asks for approval for further investigation of the project. Healthcommons garden project chairs MGs Pam Knudson and Sharon Schultz have been working on tracking the history of the Health Commons garden project started in 2019-2020. Please note the project description and budget. They have met with numerous county officials(Sandoval County Manager, County Works director, Jayme Espinsoa) and Rachel Zweig to determine what the county wants and what they are willing to support. There is presently a design plan that may or may not be used on the reboot. Outreach Committee notes that this project has been on hold for awhile and in some form(either the previous plan or one that fits better with the present situation at the county office) should move forward because the Healthcommons area could be used as a green area for the county offices. The project chairs have submitted a proposal with a budget,

and are asking for approval to meet with the county, discuss what we can do and what support we need and how much buy in from the county extension office is available.

3) Placitas Elementary School Gardening Project. Sandy Liakus and Donna Popp were the previous chairs for this project that is also on hold due to the pandemic. The school has asked that this project be restarted. Sandy and Donna are ready to consult with the new project chairs when they are named.

Member Engagement Task Force Findings

How many members do we lose annually and how do we keep members engaged? I

looked at the numbers statewide, talked to MGs and extension agents, and reviewed SEMG member surveys, finding that membership is stable across counties. For SEMG, 25-35 interns join each year, and the same number leave. For Bernalillo County, the size of the room and how many can be accommodated was the only limit on how many interns to take. Their theory is the more the merrier. Chief reasons for leaving are health of the member or family, death of member and moving out of our region. Additional reasons include inability to complete the intern classes, financial burden, a personality conflict, and not bonding with other members. Covid exacerbated problems plus it ended in-person intern classes. Today it is more difficult for members to meet each other and form friendships than pre-Covid.

Bernalillo County MGs identified that member acknowledgment is a big factor in retention and that large counties with 150+ (Bernalillo, Sandoval, and Santa Fe) also have a hard time gathering members together and knowing one another. Bernalillo organizes a yearly Tomato Festival which brings nearly all members together. Members having fun together stay involved. Community fosters engagement.

Create a Member Engagement Team
A Member Engagement Team would be tasked with bringing back favorite SEMG

activities and introducing new ways for members to interact. The goal of the team is member engagement and retention. In talking to MGs, good ideas emerged. Janet Blair expanded a proposed meet-and-greet at Heidi's new ice cream shop to include an educational talk on best raspberry growing practices. Janet referenced The League of Women Voters "Learning Lunches" at which members meet and learn from an expert monthly. Sam Thompson explained the educational and popular intern field trips which began in 2021. The trips are open to veterans when space allows. An additional field

trip for veterans is a possibility. Resurrecting our yearly member garden potluck, starting garden coffee hours, tours of member gardens, or a book group are engagement ideas worth exploring.

In discussing engagement, MGs mentioned logistical challenges: searching website, remembering new yearly passwords, finding education opportunities, learning about upcoming field trips, and accessing information on scholarships and costs of re-taking intern classes.

Proposal for Member Engagement Team

Create a "Membership Engagement Team" to create and implement several yearly

activities for retaining veteran master gardener members, re-engaging lapsed members, and bringing new and veteran members together.

Create and analyze a yearly intern/veteran survey to determine success of year's activities and possibilities for new group member events.
